Your guide to sharing faith this Lent

For many Christians, our faith and our relationship with God are a key part of who we are, something we feel deep in our souls. But sharing that personal sense of faith with others can sometimes be daunting.



The Revd Sonya Newton realises the challenge this poses to many of us and so has pulled together a selection of resources to equip us to share our stories during Lent and beyond.

She said, "We worry about what we're going to say, we worry we are going to mess with their journey somehow if we say the wrong thing and we worry about how we are going to answer any questions that people might ask us.

"The thing is, there's not a one-size-fits-all way of sharing our faith. The most important thing is to be open and to be sharing the stories of Jesus at work in our lives with the people around us. How we do that, is to find ways of becoming more confident and frankly, have a practice."

The diocesan website has a series of Easter to Pentecost Lectionary reflections that people can use to focus on sharing faith through the readings. There is a guide to telling your story, for use in small groups, home groups, coffee mornings etc or as part of an away day. The resource is useful to work through with others so you can practice sharing your story with your friends.

Ebworth

It was lovely to have a covering of snow at Ebworth in early January. It makes everywhere feel so magical.

Cold weather can cause bird movements as feeding opportunities become unavailable in frozen ground and water. During this cold snap there were up to 43 lapwings using the fields on Overtown Farm to feed. They hung around for about a week, and it was lovely seeing them whilst about on site. I was wondering where they came from until I

took a trip to Slimbridge. The wet grasslands which are usually teeming with birds, including hundreds of lapwings, were frozen solid with only a few geese left grazing the grass.



The stonechats using the wildflower strips along the main entrance drive are very obvious at the moment and can easily be seen perching on fence posts and tall grass. This species feed purely on invertebrates so struggle in cold weather. It is at this time of year that we see the large flocks of redwings and fieldfare feeding in the fields on Overtown Farm. This can be a real spectacle with hundreds of each species present. Despite the large numbers they can be hard to spot, especially if they are in longer vegetation. It's always worth scanning the fields with binoculars even if you think nothing is there. You are often surprised by a big flock of birds!

We are currently in the process of planning the planting of two traditional orchards on Overtown Farm. One will be opposite the exiting orchard at The Ebworth Centre and the other will be re-planting a historic orchard down in Flock Mill. We will be planting a mix of traditional Gloucestershire apples, plums, and pears. With some walnut, medlar and quince too. The orchard up at the Ebworth Centre will host every known Gloucestershire variety of apple and act as a mother orchard, supplying cuttings for future grafting.

We will be planting the trees in February and will be helped by Sheepscombe and Cranham Primary Schools along with our amazing regular volunteers all with the invaluable support from the Gloucestershire Orchard Trust.

Aerial Views of the Cotswolds: a film show
by Kate Peake, given to Cranham Local History Society
on Thursday, 8th January 2026

Good numbers turned up for the society's AGM and even more for the film show which followed, despite rain and sleet and a warning of snow and high winds. The committee continues as before. The main event of the last year apart from some excellent meetings was the opening of the Pound.

The film show was provided by Kate Peake. She has, using a drone camera, created aerial films covering much of our local area. All the films are short but show with remarkable clarity what lies beneath. She began with Chipping Campden, famous as a wool market town and a splendid parish church, and a market hall almost sold to the USA in 1942. She moved on to Broadway Tower, which dates back to 1798, and then to Broadway, named for its main street, which carried the main Worcester to London road, and to Belas Knapp, a remarkable Neolithic burial site, two miles above Winchcombe.

From there by way of Cleeve Hill and Leckhampton Hill to Brimpsfield Castle, Painswick Beacon and Painswick. The castle motte is overgrown but still visible, though it was all but razed to the ground after 1322, when John Gifford, head of a family which had come over with the Conqueror, was executed by Edward II after a failed rebellion. We leapt back further in time with views over the Beacon, and then forward by several thousand years to Painswick itself. Aerial views reveal street patterns but can't quite convey just how vibrant the place must have been with thirty mills at its peak in the 19th century.

Finally, Kate engaged us with history in the making, the new A417 road, set to open we understand later this year. We have been watching our local landscape change before our eyes. Our local bats have much to be grateful for, with a converted bunker, boxes and underpasses, and also walkers, with bridges built for both the Cotswold and the Gloucestershire Ways. Wildlife will also be able to cross at leisure with the aid of an impressively wide green bridge. A big thank you to Kate: we loved it all but the A417 film especially. It is remarkable what a single drone camera in skilled hands can achieved.

The next meeting of the History Society will be in Thursday, 19th March, when Gareth Howell will be talking on the subject of 'Medieval Medicine: Superstition and Science'.

Cranham Common News

We are almost at the end of the winter maintenance on the common, which finishes at the end of February. A lot of work has been done by Natural England and village workparties, concentrating this year on removing scrub oaks from the grassland, and the eternal job of clearing brambles for the brushcutting team.

The cows have also done a good job of eating the grass, leaving a mixed height sward of short, grazed areas as well as longer tussocky grass areas.

The aim is not to remove all scrub from the common because of the importance of these areas for all sorts of wildlife. A mosaic of hawthorn, blackthorn and wild rose, with some more dense shrub and bramble patches are essential for birds and insects and our important adder population.

We look forward to welcoming the spring flowers soon.

How could YOU help?

We always need helpers for maintenance of the common, and we do need more volunteers. This may be from occasional jobs like moving a cow trough or putting up a fence, and of course for the work parties, and we have a WhatsApp group which allows more rapid communication between volunteers. Please contact me if you would like to be added to this group, with your mobile phone number.

Our 2026 events start with the first coffee morning meeting of the year, on Saturday 7th February at Brimpsfield Village Hall; our speaker will be Robert Champion who will talk about hardy fuchsias. Then on 7th March, in a change to our original programme, the knowledgeable Roger Umpelby will speak about 'Pests and Diseases of Fruit'; after an excellent fruit year in 2025, find out how to have another in 2026! Both talks start at 11am, with coffee and home-made cake available from 10.30am.



This is a good month, before most plants start to come fully into growth, to spend a little time taking a long hard look at what needs doing in the garden; it's easier to spot problem areas when the branches are bare and leaves have not yet sprouted. In particular, consider whether anything needs cutting back, moving or – dare I say it – removing entirely. Gardens never stand still; plants grow, and by that I don't just mean that they survive, but that they get bigger – often very much bigger – over time. The little thing that you brought back from the garden centre some years ago might now be an enormous shrub or a spreading perennial that encroaches on space meant for its neighbours or might be casting shade where none was intended or wanted. It might even have become a bit of a weed. Now is the time to think hard, take decisions and come up with a plan of action to make your garden more successful for the future!

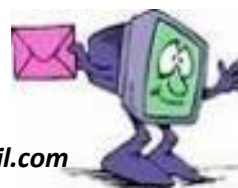

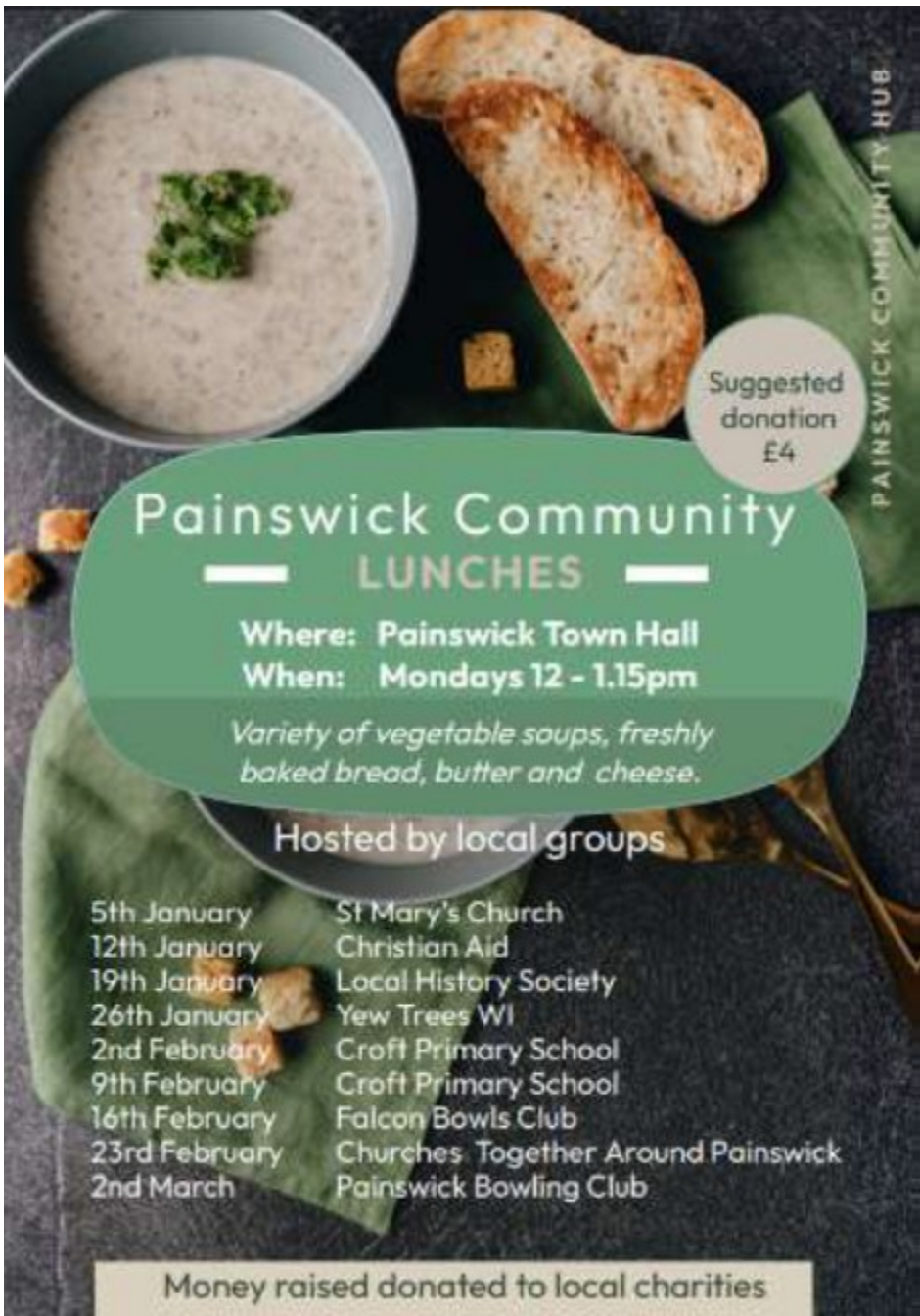
